The Mayor's Corner



Greetings!

Warmer weather is upon us which means increased outdoor activities for the entire family. Our public works have been working throughout the town cleaning, mulching and planting at our various public buildings, parks and recreation centers. As you prepare for the upcoming spring and summer seasons, please remember to maintain your grass and property in order, out of respect for your neighbors. Our code enforcement department will be monitoring properties throughout the municipality for any maintenance violations. Should you have a neighboring property that may have been abandoned and/or is overgrown, please call or email our code enforcement department so that they may rectify the situation. Well maintained properties improve your curb appeal and make for a pleasant neighborhood environment.

Once again, I am extremely pleased to inform you that we continue to maintain a nearly flat local tax rate levy in our 2016 municipal budget. While the state law allows a 2% increase in the tax levy, we have only adjusted that levy by 0.004% which means the average home assessed at \$131,000 will only have a change in their local municipal tax of \$4.96 for the year! Our continued economic redevelopment and fiscal management policies have allowed us to maintain a very stable tax rate environment while expanding our tax base and spreading the costs over more tax payers instead of increasing the cost to our existing base of tax payers. Our municipality's Net Valuation increased for the third straight year another \$3 million dollars as a result of our continued growth and financial stability of our housing and commercial properties. We are awaiting final numbers for the county and school tax levies for 2016 and will provide a detailed tax levy summary in the next newsletter once their budgets have also been adopted.

We have awarded the first phase of our sewer infrastructure rehabilitation and work will be commencing this

spring/summer on five streets. We will post the projected construction schedule on our website once approved by the borough. We are currently out to bid on the second phase of our sewer program, which includes five additional streets, and hope to receive competitive bids and award the work in April. We are also bidding four additional street reconstruction/paving projects that are slated for work this year. Once all bids are awarded and construction schedules are finalized, we will post the schedule to our website.

We were successful in obtaining a county recreation grant that will be used to install a new mulch bed system at our Kennedy Boulevard playground. This newer product should last longer, provide better drainage and increase the "cushion" when tumbling or falling occurs. We will be installing this new system in the spring as we know this playground gets a tremendous amount of use.

I am also happy to report that the Governing Body has approved a \$350,000 investment in the renovation of our Senior/Community Center. The renovations will include a new roof, flooring, windows, doors, exterior enhancements and a complete reconfiguring of the interior to relocate the kitchen area and expand the banquet/seating areas. New bathrooms and a kitchen serving bar as well as a dance floor area is also planned as part of the renovations. Work has begun and we anticipate completion by July.

Finally, I would like to remind each of you to start or continue to take advantage of our "Shop Somerdale" program which helps our local businesses while providing you an opportunity to save on your property tax bill. There is an updated Shop Somerdale listing in this newsletter and I encourage you to use your card whenever possible. If you lost your card or need additional cards for family members, please contact Michele, our Borough Clerk and she will make sure you get a new one. If you are a business owner in town, our program is also available to all of your employees, whether they live in town or outside our community. They too can save and benefit from this unique program!

I hope each of you have a safe and fun-filled spring and summer! I look forward to seeing you at our upcoming events and town meetings.



RESIDENTIAL ELECTRIC SAVINGS PROGRAM

In 2014, the borough's Governing Body took steps to prepare us to "bid" an aggregated (consolidated) electric supply for our residents. We held a town meeting and the concept was overwhelmingly endorsed by everyone in our packed meeting room.

Following that meeting, we initiated a bid for our PSE&G residents and after receiving the bids, determined that the savings were not substantive enough to warrant awarding a contract. Since that time, we have been monitoring the cost of electric and waiting for the best time to once again go out for bid.

You probably already have realized that electric has dropped to an all-time low for many reasons. Our experts now tell us that we may realize solid long-term savings for our Atlantic City Electric households as the cost of electric is expected to increase in the near future. We are also looking at the electric cost for our PSE&G households but the savings are not as great at this time.

Consequently, we are preparing to go out for bid in conjunction with some other municipalities for our Atlantic City Electric based households in the hope that we may achieve as much as a 10% savings for our residents. As always, should the savings be nominal, we will not proceed and if we believe that similar savings for our PSE&G households are evident, we will also bid that group as well.

If you have forgotten how the program works or are a newer resident in our community, please go to website and scroll down on the home page. You will find a link on the program that will play a short video where I and our consultant explain how the program works.

Also, we will be sending out additional information as we proceed with the bid process to keep you well informed. I would like to close by reminding you that the borough makes no money on the program. It is designed to pass all savings directly to you through reduced energy costs by bulk purchasing (as a consolidated group) energy on behalf of our residents.

We are happy to offer this option to you and hope that it will result in savings for all of our residents.

FROM THE DESK OF POLICE CHIEF ANTHONY CAMPBELL

Dear Neighbors:

Hope this time of year finds all of you healthy and happy!!

Late night car burglaries are again popping up in various sections of town and in surrounding communities.

With the warm weather this seems to be more prevalent, especially when more people tend to leave their vehicles unlocked or windows down.

All auto break-ins usually have one thing in common: **there was something left in the car worth stealing.** Most larcenies from cars are "crimes of opportunity" that could be prevented by taking some preventative steps.

Do not leave valuables in your vehicle: You would be surprised how often this happens, but individuals leave valuable items in plain sight all the time. If you leave items in your vehicle and they are visible, the chances your vehicle will get broken into increase greatly.

Place items out of sight BEFORE reaching your destination: Someone may be watching when you put your valuables under a seat or in the trunk. The moment you leave your vehicle, a thief could break into it. This happens at times at LA Fitness when women put their purse in the trunk upon arriving at the parking lot. So place those items in a safe place before you get to the park, beach, baseball game, etc. Valuable items that thieves target are GPS units, MP3 players, credit cards, money, packages and so forth. If you cannot take the items with you, secure them in a safe place in your vehicle, like a locked glove compartment or your trunk.

Avoid leaving packages or shopping bags out in the open: Lock them into your trunk, if you have to leave the vehicle unattended. Never open a trunk, fill it full of valuables, close it, and then just walk away.

Lock ALL of your vehicle's doors: This is true even if you plan on only being gone for just a second. Remember, it only takes seconds to steal items from your car. It is not uncommon, for thieves to walk down row of parked vehicles, looking for unlocked doors. Also, make sure car windows are not left open.

Park in busy, well-lit areas: Pick a parking spot where there is a lot of activity. Auto thieves prefer breaking into cars in isolated areas.

Do not leave a trace: Do not leave any sign that there might be valuables "out of sight" in your vehicle. For example: the suction cup on your dashboard, might tell thieves, that you have a GPS system in your vehicle.

Leave nothing in plain view: Very few auto break-ins are random. The thieves usually see something out in the open or hints of possible hidden valuables.

Alarms or anti-theft devices work: Thieves are usually looking for the easiest target. If your car has an alarm, it could act as a deterrent. But do not make this common mistake: Just because you have an alarm, doesn't mean thieves won't break-in, IF you leave valuable items in plain sight.

Do not leave spare keys in your vehicle: An experienced thief knows all the hiding places. Store spare keys elsewhere, possibly your wallet or purse.

Report suspicious activity or suspicious people: If you see something that gives you that funny feeling...report it so we can check it out. Most times you were right. If not, no problem, people will know we are in your neighborhood.

See it, Hear it, Report it.

SPRING CLEAN UP – spring clean up will begin on/about April 1ST. The leaf-vac will be out once a week through Friday April 29th. At the end of spring clean up the leaf-vac will not be out until late October. Rake leaves to curb. Leaves must be free of debris, no trash, pet waste, brush/branches, etc. State Law requires all debris to be a minimum of 10 feet from any storm inlet.

VEGETATIVE RECYCLING – Veg waste will be collected starting Tuesday May 3rd and continue every Tuesday through the last Tuesday in September. Collection will be every Tuesday except after a Monday holiday, collection will be the next scheduled Tuesday. All waste must be in open containers with handles and drain holes or biodegradable paper bags. **NO PLASTIC BAGS!!**

BRUSH/TREE BRANCHES – all tree work performed by a contractor must be removed by the contractor. The borough will remove brush/branches trimmed by the homeowner. It must be four (4) foot long or longer with a diameter no larger than six (6) inches. Brush/branches will be collected every Wednesday (weather permitting). All cut ends **MUST** be facing the same direction stacked at the curb. All stumps and logs are the homeowner's responsibility to have removed. A maximum of 20 minutes will be spent at any one stop, time permitting we will return at the end of the day or the next scheduled day for pick-up. Vines, sticker bushes and other shrubbery not a minimum of four (4) foot long or longer must be bundled and tied or in containers for removal with the regular trash collection on Wednesday.

CALL (811) BEFORE YOU DIG – Homeowners, you **MUST** call for utility mark-outs before digging on your property. Please notify NJ One Call at **811** or 1-800-272-1000 to get all utilities located to avoid the chance of hitting a line while digging, **It's the Law.**

TIRES – All tires must be removed from the rims. Two tires may be placed in with your regular trash for collection, the rim will be collected with the bulky metal pick-up on Wednesday.

LATEX PAINT – To dispose of latex paint, open can & let dry thoroughly, then place in with regular trash. (Paint cans are not recyclable). No oil based paints, solvents, Thinners, or stains of any kind are to be placed in the trash, these are considered Hazardous Waste and must be disposed of properly.

PROPANE TANKS- The public works department cannot pick-up your old tanks. They are considered Hazardous Waste and must be disposed of properly. They can be taken to an authorized propane dealer and exchanged for a full tank or they may be taken to one of the county hazardous waste collections.

PROHIBITED DISPOSAL – The disposal of grease or toxic or hazardous materials via the sewer system shall be prohibited.

PROHIBITED CONNECTIONS – The use of the sanitary sewer system for the following is prohibited, and under no circumstances will any of the following be connected to the system directly or indirectly, and any such existing connections are hereby prohibited and shall be removed forthwith;

Little Known Facts about Somerdale

EXCERPTS FROM THE BOOK - Taverns, Farms & Hamlets of Somerdale

By Martin C. Hansen

CHAPTER 3: ANTHONY WARRICK – BENEFACTOR

The New Jersey Archives indicate that Abraham Warwick and Rebeckah Britton were married on December 29, 1750 in Upper Freehold Burlington County. There be but three Warwicks listed in the Archives, and their chronological sequence infers that Anthony Warwick, who was married to Elizabeth Crawford at Gloucester on October 5, 1775, was the son of Abraham.

The caption of an old document dated October 31, 1796, reads as follows, "A private road from the land that leads from the Egg Road Thos. Brarington." Details of the preamble shows that, "At a meeting at the dwelling house of Anthony Warwick; John Day, Jeremiah Woods, Jno Blackwood, and Ephraim Tomlinson, duly appointed surveyors of Waterford, Gloucester Town and Gloucester Township laid out a road thirty feet wide."

The dwelling house with the initials "A" and "E" over the letter "W" with the date 1794 fashioned with black brick of the Eastern wall, which formerly stood in the grass plot in front of Sterling High School, was, in fact, the dwelling house of Anthony Warrick.

There was no written history of this house in 1962, when the board of education had it moved southward to the north side of Signey Run to the property of young Larry Dobbs who occupied it until he and his family moved to Medford. Shortly after removal the house was allegedly rented to a group of students from Glassboro state collage whose carelessness led to a fire, which left little, but the walls standing.

Shortly thereafter these remains were demolished and pushed into the Signey Run ravine. The Hi-Nella Inn now stands on the site. While the Warrick 1794 house has been lost, there still remains standing another Warrick house located farther up Warrick road, just before mildred avenue. This house, which is still occupied in my opinion may have been the original Warrick homestead.

Anthony Warrick is considered by this writer to be the first citizen whose vision, enterprise and ambition have left the most lasting impression on our area during these two centuries of our independence.

The misspelling in "Prowells" History of Camden County 1886, which produced "Anthony Warrich, and the extension of his road to Haddonfield which led to the vulgate "Warwick Road" has led to the loss of this name from our area.

In the year of our Bicentennial the slight to our distinguished predecessor should have been corrected officially by Municipal and County resolutions and appropriate changes in street maps, records and signs should have occurred promptly thereafter.

The student of agricultural history will find much of interest in "Prowells' History" which makes Warrick's discovery of the use of potash its first note in the agricultural section as follows, "Anthony Warrich, a farmer near Chews Landing, owned large tracts of timberland and sent cord wood and lumber to the Philadelphia market from his landing at the head of Navegation on the north branch of Timber Creek. A brick maker of the City, with whom he dealt, offered to load, free of cost, one of his vessels with wood ashes if framer would take them away from encumbrancing his brick yard. The farmer finally consented and the ashes were landed on his wharf, and his sons hauled this valuable fertilizer to a field where it was spread on land which corn was to be planted. The effect was magical and people came from far and near to see the result; for as much corn was raised by that process on five acres thus fertilized as previously had grown on twenty acres of the same kind of land. The brick makers, brewers and foundryman had no trouble thereafter in disposing of this troublesome commodity, and in fact, soon began to reap a revenue from it.

A serious study of the Warrick Road dedication, viewing the lines of on old map, and, on site observations of present tree growth will lead to the determination of the original Warrick Road south of Signey Run (referred to as Seganyo Run in 1796).

The beginning of this road, "the road that leads from the Egg Harbor Road to Joseph Borton's Mill" is now commonly referred to as Laurel Road. The specific point of beginning was located by a buttonwood tree which stood just N.E. of John F. Kennedy Hospital toward White Horse Pike. The alignment of this old road still is evident in the short section of Grand Avenue in Stratford which is further extended by the line of trees on the east side of St. Luke's Church. At Vasser Avenue this line changes to a northwardly direction proceeding behind Samuel Yellin School to a point where it again changes to a north westward direction to cross a low point at Signey Run (nee Seganyo Run). The rest of the road still appears to be in its original position.

It should be noted that Signey Run, as it is called today, was in 1796 called Seganyo Run. According to Frank H. Stewart's "Notes on Old Gloucester County" on the third day of December, 1712, a road "commonly called Irish Road" from Porters Mill to Gloucester crossed over Sheyanees Run. The New Jersey Archives of Colonial Documents, page 678, under date 1708 April 28, describes 240 acres "on a small run emptying into the north branch of Timber Creek alias Gloucester River opposite to the Indian or Sheganees' Field. . ." This analogy, while providing us with all of the respective names of one stream, also reveals the name of the subtribe of Indians who formerly lived here.



Trash Contract

It has been three years since we contracted with Republic Services for our trash removal. The contract will expire in June 2016 and consequently we are writing new bid specs and will go out for bid in April/May. As part of the bid preparation, we are evaluating options currently available to reduce cost and streamline the collection process.

Recently, trash haulers have greatly improved their equipment allowing them to utilize the same trucks for both manual and automated trash collection. We have reviewed the results of other recent municipal bids and have seen trash collection bids that offer significant savings when switched from all manual collections to a combination of automated & manual collection.

Therefore, we are bidding this new three year contract with the provision that bidders provide both all manual and automated/manual collection options. We are also requiring that bidders are capable of utilizing trash trucks that run on compressed natural gas as opposed to diesel or gasoline. This is a much more environmentally conscience alternative and earns our community sustainable energy points in our efforts to become bronze certified.

Should we opt to convert to an automated/manual trash collection solution, specific trash containers must be utilized to accommodate the trash truck equipment and processes. Streets that are not conducive to a safe and efficient automated process will continue to be serviced manually as we do at the current time. The borough will acquire the initial trash cans and will provide one to each household at no cost for those residents that will be receiving automated trash collection services. You will be required to place your trash receptacle at the curb line with no vehicles blocking access to the trash can from the street.

There are two trash container sizes, 64 gallon and 96 gallon with the larger unit estimated to accommodate trash storage for a family of 5. The smaller units are targeted for smaller family sizes and seniors, but each resident, regardless of your family scenario will initially receive the larger receptacle. If the smaller receptacle is preferred, public works will exchange the can at your request once you have received the first, larger receptacle.

The borough will allow residents who believe their trash storage needs exceed one container, the ability to purchase an additional container at our reduced volume costs that will be determined as part of the bid process. Generally speaking, the containers range from \$50 to \$70 per can depending on the size and bulk quantity we purchase. The receptacles are guaranteed for 10 years, are quite sturdy and much larger than you may think. Samples are available for your viewing at the borough and this photo depicts the two sizes that would be available. We will receive, as part of the bid package, firm prices on the receptacles which will be part of our decision making process concerning the actual savings of automation versus manual collection.

Should the borough receive bids that result in reasonable savings by converting to the automated option, we would most likely begin the process by awarding a contract in June (prior to the expiration of our current contract on June 30th). At this time, we do not know what the lead time would be on purchasing the receptacles and implementing the program but I wanted to provide adequate notice to each of you so that you would not invest in your own replacement trash receptacles (should you be planning to do so) as they would not be useable for automation purposes. Therefore, I suggest that you wait until after the end of June for any new trash receptacle purchase to give us time to go through the bid process and make a final determination.

Once we know whether automation is financially beneficial through the receipt of bids, we will post our decision to our website and have a follow up article in the summer newsletter. In the meantime, feel free to stop by the borough and check out the sample trash receptacles.

One last note, we will have a choice for the color of the trash receptacles so do not assume that the sample green receptacles will be the same color for our community. And finally, we are not currently offering or selling these containers as we must wait until we receive the bid results and make a final decision.

As always, we welcome your feedback and hope that you recognize our continued efforts to control costs and provide better service to our community as a whole.
